At this date (13 Sept. 1999), it has been difficult to obtain the microfilms dated earlier than the generation of Mark Rollason, the documentation needed in order to verify what is here charted. My mother spoke of her father, Albert Rollason, as being in charge of designing the construction of the pulpits, stairs and the artwork details for churches in England. In the 1881 census my Grandfather, at 18 years of age was a "Draughtsman". His marriage certificate, and of my mother's marriage record show that he was a "Designer" and the birth certificate of Alan Edward states he was a church furniture designer. He designed the woodwork for the pulpits and banisters of the English churches; just as I remember my mother telling us.

The documents we have found record their residence and find those roads on an 1855 map of Birmingham seen. Also found, quoting from Alan's letter, "The road where my mother (and presumably also yours) lived in as a child building and by law cannot be destroyed or altered". In 1996 the following story was delivered on a tape. Rollason and Elizabeth (Chambers) then moved to a new first road to be built by John Cadbury. It was a grand house the Cadburys built a factory.
